

2014-17 SYLLABUS

We're delighted to launch our new Speech and Drama and Musical Theatre Syllabuses. We've made some big changes in response to suggestions from our teachers and examiners, especially to our Grade and Musical Theatre exams. We know you'll like what you see.


Grade Examination Changes

In terms of practical requirements: in Grade 2, the illustration will now be the focus of a more formal one-minute presentation on the poem; we've moved the lyric from Grade 6 to Grade 8 (the Grade 6 poem is now to be a short poem by an Irish poet); we've swapped the prepared and unprepared improvisations, the former coming in Grade 7, with the latter in Grade 8; the mime in Grade 9 is now either character or abstract; the poem in Grade 11 is to be a sonnet only; and in Grade 12, the poem is to be written after 1960 and the prose is to be by a non-Irish author (Grade 9 prose is by an Irish author). In terms of the drama selections, in Grade 8 it's by an Irish author and in Grade 11 it's to be written before 1800.

Theory requirements have been made more specific while retaining their relevance to the pieces being performed. By the end of Grade 10, candidates will have covered all aspects of vocal modulation. We've brought back stage directions in Grade 5; we think it's important that Grade 3 candidates should understand the difference between a vowel and a consonant; and that pitch, rate and pace are addressed explicitly in other grades. We still don't require young people to learn about things that they don't need to know.

New Musical Theatre Syllabus

Our new Musical Theatre syllabus encourages teachers and students to explore the rich diversity of musical theatre, and to experience the thrill of performing pieces from different eras and genres. In the Group exams, the emphasis is purely on performance and engagement. In our solo and duet exams, we expect candidates to have a significant understanding of the narrative and dramatic contexts of the pieces they are performing and to display an increasing level of skill as they progress through the grades. The Syllabus Guidelines explain the context to the exam requirements. **PLEASE READ THEM.**

Diploma Examinations

Booking Examination Dates

The more notice you can give us of your proposed examination date(s) the better. As soon as you've set a date (and have checked it against school calendars/ Communion and Confirmation dates), please contact us, even if it's three or four months in advance. We will then treat this as a [provisional booking](#).

Remember that either side of the Easter Holidays, and April, May and June are our busiest times and that, if you leave it until the last minute to try and book a date at these times, we may not be able to accommodate you.

Entry Forms

Entry Forms are a must. We have designed them carefully to provide all the information we need to administer your exams.



Bookings will only be CONFIRMED once we have received completed and signed entry forms. Entry Forms MUST be received in the Irish Board office NO LATER than one calendar month prior to the proposed date of the examination. They may be posted or scanned and emailed to us. Unfortunately, we can no longer confirm bookings on the basis of a phone call, text or email.

Examination Regulations

In the Irish Board we try to keep the rules and bureaucracy to a minimum. Some rules are necessary to enable us to be as flexible as we are in relation to dates and other matters.
